Icebreaker: When's the last time you were awestruck?

Read Acts 2:42–44

- What does it mean to be devoted to someone or something?
- Why was the apostles' teaching so crucial for this community?
- What is the connection between the apostles' teaching and our Bible?
- What would it look like for people in church to be devoted to fellowship?
- What kinds of things get in the way of true fellowship within the church?
- Breaking bread and prayers help define fellowship. Why are both of these aspects important to believers connecting with each other?
- The breaking of bread likely included both Communion/The Lord's Supper as well as sharing a meal together.
 - Why was Communion/The Lord's Supper an important part of the early Christian church? Why is Communion an important part of the church today?
- Why do you think "awe came upon every soul" at that time and place? Consider what happened at the end of Chapter 2 in response to Peter's sermon as well as what happens here at the start of the church in Jerusalem.
- When have you been in awe of God's work?
- In the early church, why would it be necessary for people to see signs and wonders being done by the apostles? (see also 2 Corinthians 12:12, Hebrews 2:3–4)
- It says all the believers were together and had all in common (v.44). Why is this possible among such a diverse group of people?
- What kinds of things can divide people in the church today? What kinds of things ought to unify us?
- How can each of us help bring greater focus to the church on the things that unify us?
